Contextually, I am working with the idea of consumerism. As you know, the context of Indian consumers is slightly different from others and also has many variations according to the various regions of the country. So, in West Bengal, we have a completely different take on consumerism. Nowadays, it is mixed up and, to some extent, wrecked by the global practice of consumerism. I feel we are going through a dystopian time, and yes, there is a strong sense of sorrow hiding behind the tremendous joy of 'brand' as a cultural element of life.

In my works, I try to recall some consuming visuals from my memory of our marketplaces and surroundings.

Also in my works, I try to express a conflicting coexistence. Where all the relationships are now controlled and unborn under the watchful eyes of something uncertain, even though they are not related and deny their physical presence, they have taught us to regard their absence like the loss of a true friend.

So I prefer to represent my works with poetic narration rather than storytelling narration. That's why sometimes I lead my viewer towards a complicated incompleteness.

This has been true since my childhood; I've been carrying such different kinds of expression as well as visuals born out of my surroundings, and I try to keep that thin-and-thick impression.

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
